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



On 30.08.2022,the Tamil Nadu State Government passed a GO (GO No.:126) and allocated an initial sum of Rs.5 crore towards the opening of a Special Centre for Tamil at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi. Next, in a function on 21.12.2022 at the Secretariat of the Government of Tamil Nadu, the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu Thiru. M.K.Stalin handed a cheque for Rs.5 crore to the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of Jawaharlal University Prof. Santishree D Pandit. In this historically important event of the establishment of a Special Centre for Tamil Studies at the Jawaharlal University, New Delhi, the Hon'ble Minister for Tamil Development Thiru. Thangam Thennarasu, Chief Secretary Thiru. V. Iraianbu, the Secretary of the Department for Tamil Development Thiru. R.Selvaraj, the Director of the Department for Tamil Development Dr. N.Arul, Professors at JNU Dr. Rama. Kumaraswami and Prof.R.Thamotharan (Aravendan) were present in the event.

The Tamil Stream of JNU and the Central Institute of Classical Tamil Studies jointly organized a Symposium entitled the "Hindi Translation of Tolkappiyam" on Sepember 1 and 2, 2022. The Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of JNU Prof. Santishree D Pandit inaugurated the Symposium.

A series of books was launched by the Hon'ble VC in the inaugural function of the Symposium. The Symposium Proceedings were published with the title "TRANSEED". Another book entitled JNU TAM-IL STUDIES which recorded the research activities of the Tamil Stream of JNU was also released. Next, research scholar Kamalakkannan's translation of the research books written by Prof. George L.Hart viz., Thamizh Sevvilakkiyangal and Thamizh Samaskrita Sevvilakkiya Uravugal were launched. Not but the least, the Hindi translation of Tholkappiyam which sprang out of the assiduous efforts of the former Professors of JNU H. Balasubramaniam and Prof. K. Nachimuthu and released by the Central Institute of Classical Tamil were introduced to the gathering.



In her address, the Hon'ble VC said, "Tholkappiyam is a time-tested grammar book immortalized by the passage of Time. Similarly, Tamil literature remains unique with its dignified portrayal of women like Kannagi and Madhavi in the kavyas".

Next, applauding the architectural finesse and the workmanship of the time-tested Thanjavur Peruvudaiyar temple, the Hon'ble VC persuaded the participants to pay a visit to the Big Temple. Later, the researchers of the Special Centre for Tamil Studies, JNU, presented a portrait of Mahakavi. Subramanya Bharathiyar as a memento to the Vice Chancellor. Thereafter, the long journey traversed by the Tamil Stream to reach its current destination the Special Centre for Tamil Studies were offered as a visual treat in the form of a video to the participants.

This Symposium was conducted in seven sessions—four sessions on the first day (01.09.2022) and three sessions on the second day (02.09.2022). Sixteen articles on various topics related to Tholkappiyam like Kilaviyakkam, Vetrumaiyiyal, Vetrumai Mayangiyal, Peyariyal, Vinaiyiyal, Agaththinaiyiyal, Puraththinaiyiyal, Kalaviyal, etc., were presented in the Symposium. All these articles were written from a comparative perspective of Tholkappiyam with the grammar books of other languages. Interestingly, the articles were presented by Professors and researchers in Hindi from various universities.

### The Indian Languages Week

The inaugural day of the Indian Languages Week Fest 12.12.2023 was celebrated as Mahakavi Subramanya Bharathiyar Day. The Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of JNU delivered the Presidential address. Next, Prof.Lakshmi belonging to the Department of Hindi, Central University of Rajasthan, delivered an impressive speech about Bharathiyar. She explained the historical background which made Bharathiyar as a national poet of great importance. Besides, She reiterated Bharathiyar's nationwide significance in relation with his contemporary milieu.

Next, writer and Commissioner of the Revenue Department Dr.Thenmozhi spoke on the topic entitled "The Creation of Kalakkadu Temple Fres-

coes from Literary Texts". With vivid illustrations, her speech illuminated how the temple frescoes were born from the literary epic Kamba Ramayana.

He mentioned how in an age which seldom knew technology, the Tamils had daringly undertaken sea voyages and trade, guided by their keen insight into nature.

The Indian Languages Day was celebrated on 15.12.2022. The function commenced with the playing of the State Song of Tamil Nadu "Thamizh Thai Vazhthu" and the State Song of Assam. 





### **Tolkappiyam Hindi Translation:**







### Ravikumar's Contribution to Tamilology

This book is a compilation of six research articles shedding light on the contribution of Ravikumar to research studies in Tamil. Ravikumar is both a writer and the editor of the research journal Manarkeni. The articles written by Professors and research scholars from India and Sri Lanka, focus on Ravikumar's doctoral research, the political literature of Eelam, etc..

### Agapporulum Samaskrita Muktaka Padalgalum

Prof. Siegfried Lienhard, a Swedish Professor of Indology in Stockholm University, identified the influence of the Tamil Agam literature (Love literature) in the Sanskrit Muktaka poems. From his meticulous research findings, he posits in his book that the Sanskrit Muktaka poems are based on the Dravidian literary tradition. Doctoral research scholar P.Kamalakkannan has compiled and translated Prof. Siegfried Lienhard's articles in Tamil.






### **Fairy Tales of France**

The French writer Charles Perrault (1608-1703) is credited with laying the foundation for the literary genre 'the fairy tale'. This book Neelathadikaran is an anthology of the translation of Perrault's ten stories including "Bluebeard". Naresh Velsami, doctoral researcher in Tamil, has translated the English version of the French fairy tales in Tamil.

### My Sri Lankan Journey

This travelogue penned by T.K.Tamil Bharathan, research scholar in the Tamil Stream of JNU, is an intricate record of his travel experiences in Sri Lanka. In a competition named "PesuThamizhaPesu" (Speak Tamilian Speak), which drew world-wide attention, organized by the Malaysian media at Colombo, T.K.Tamil Bharathan, participated and bagged the second prize.





### The Guide

This book is a Festschrift offered by the Professors and research scholars of the Tamil Stream, JNU as a tribute to the active contribution of Prof. H. Balasubramaniam(1932-2021) to Tamil research during his tenure as Visiting Faculty at the Tamil Stream, JNU.

### Ariviyal Thamizh Thatha (The Grandpop of Scientific Tamil)

This book brings to light Prof. Rama Sundaram's (1938-2021) contribution to research in Tamil. He is credited with coining more than one and a half lakh scientific terms in Tamil. Besides, he has translated on the Sangam Tamil poems "Paththuppattu" (The Ten Idylls) in English and applied the challenging theory of Glossematics for his research.





## Oppiyal Parvaiyil Thamizh Sevviyal (A Comparative Perspective of Tamil Classics)

During the Covid -19 pandemic in 2021, the Tamil Stream of JNU organized an international conference in virtual mode. This book is a compilation of the 13 articles that were presented in the conference. The articles in this Anthology trace the literary and grammatical relationship among Tamil, Telugu, Malayalam, Kannada, Sanskrit, Pali, Prakrit, Sinhala languages.

## Thamizhin Meedhu Dhoorathu Parvai (A Distant Perspective on Tamil)

Prof.E.Annamalai is a veteran scholar in both Tamil literature as well as linguistics. He had worked at Chicago University, US and served as Visiting Professor in several world renowned universities. This book presents an overview of his tireless contribution to Tamil Studies.







### Muraimai (Methodology)





## Aristotilin Iyarpiyal Karuthunilai Thamizhakkam (Conceptual translation of Aristotle's Physics)

The book Phusike akroasisis a compilation of the great Greek philosopher Aristotle's theory about natural sciences. It offers Aristotle's ideas about metamorphosis, infinity, space, vacuum, and time. T.K.Tamil Bharathan and K.Jayabharathi have jointly translated the English version of the Greek book in Tamil and it was published in Venice, Italy in July 2023.

## Thinai Kolgai Uruvakkamum Sadangiyal Thonmaviyal Moolangalum

This book is the Tamil translation of the English translation of the Russian book Ritual and Mythological Sources of Early Tamil Poetry authored by Prof. Alexander M. Dubyansky (1941-1920). Prof. Dubyansky, a Russian, assiduously learnt Tamil in the late 1960s and obtained his doctoral degree specializing in the topic "Mullai Thinai Padalgal" (The Poetry of the Forest Trope). Ritual and Mythological Sources of Early Tamil Poetry is an extension of Prof. Dubyansky's doctoral research. In his attempt to investigate the source of Thinai, which is an exclusive feature of Tamil *Akam* poems, Prof.Dubyansky posits that the ritual and mythological elements could have originated from the backdrop of Thinai. This book, which was originally written in Russian was published in 1989. Later, it was translated in English in 2000. Now, P.Kamalakannan, doctoral research scholar at the Special Centre for Tamil Studies of JNU has translated Prof. Dubyansky's book from English to Tamil.





### Noorum Sadhagamum: Thamizh Samaskirutha Sevvilakkiya Oppaivu

This book makes a comparative study of the Tamil poem Ainkurunooru and Bhartrihari's Sanskrit poem Sringara Sataka. In the light of the principles put forth in Tolkappiyam, this book offers an elaborate explanation of Thinai(land-scape), metaphorical expressions and other literary conventions employed in both the texts and identifies the similarities and dissimilarities between them. K.Vignesh, pursuing doctoral research at the Special Centre for Tamil Studies, JNU has written this book.
