

In Conversation with...

A Conversation with **Prof. Manuel Alfonso Patarroyo**, Professor at the Universidad del Rosario's Medical School (Bogotá, Colombia)



Q: Who was your biggest inspiration to enter in this field?

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: My biggest inspiration from very early in

my life has been my father. Imagine Colombia, a country where research was not even a career choice 30 years ago, and my father, with his tenacity and discipline was able to put Colombia in the world's science map. That is a tremendous task! I hope I can continue learning and working by his side for a very long time.

Q. What is your perspective on a synthetic vaccine vis-a-vis a recombinant protein vaccine or a whole organism vaccine?

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: A fully protective vaccine against malaria will surely have to contain multiple epitopes from the different parasite stages. Although you could achieve this goal following the recombinant protein approach, producing different minimal subunit-based candidates through peptide synthesis will allow producing a higher yield, with greater purity and at a lower cost, so I would definitely go for the peptide synthesis approach.

Q. With the rising genetic variations and artemisinin resistance in the parasite what do you think that the present-day researcher should focus on? Vaccine or drugs?

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: Malaria remains a huge problem worldwide, I think that a lesson that we must remember from the mid-20th century, is when antimalarials were being administered worldwide and the WHO launched the global eradication agenda that 20 years later failed completely. That is a humbling lesson, we are facing a powerful enemy and for combating it the best way possible, a multidisciplinary approach will be required, where public health measures should be strengthened and research in both drugs and vaccines has to be properly funded.

Q. Plasmodium vivax is a difficult system to study because of technical limitations, with respect to vaccine development how should one go about studying this pathogen?

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: We are following a comparative

approach with Plasmodium falciparum. This parasite species has been better characterized in terms of vaccine candidates, so searching homologous proteins in Plasmodium vivax to those already described as good vaccine candidates in Plasmodium falciparum has resulted in a good alternative for somehow sorting out the drawbacks of working with P. vivax.

Q. In countries like India where there is equal prevalence of falciparum and vivax, what should be the right strategy – a single vaccine or separate vaccines for both?

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: From the evolutionary point of view, Plasmodium falciparum and Plasmodium vivax are not closely related. Taking into account that inducing a cross-protective immune response against parasite strains belonging to even the same species is rather difficult, achieving a cross-protective response against a different species would seem highly unlikely, so different vaccines against Plasmodium falciparum and Plasmodium vivax will be required.

Q. How was your experience of visiting JNU and what impression do you have of the research going on here in our university.

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: We were very happy to meet with the JNU staff and scientists. You have very strong groups in malaria (like Professor Deepak Gaur's group) and in other disciplines. So congratulations and thanks again for your hospitality! Let's hope we could organize some joint projects to start collaborating.

Q. What advice would you have for our budding young students who wish to take research as a career.

Prof. M.A. Patarroyo: I guess that a lot of people take up a career in science with the wrong expectations...a lot think... "let's pipette twice and wait for the Nobel prize to arrive". This is a very hard career...it will require a lot of discipline and a lot of patience. Most of the experiments will give negative results...so you will have to be persistent, read a lot and figure out how to change your experimental setup to get the proper results. If after reading the previous paragraph, you still believe that you have the right personality to pursue this career...think big and work hard!

SBT Research Scholar Sneha Roy invited speaker at Gordon Conference on Disordered Proteins, Switzerland receives CBSE Washington University Award

Ms. Sneha Roy, Ph. D. Student working in the laboratory of Prof. Rajiv Bhat at School of Biotechnology, JNU was selected as an invited speaker at the Gordon Research Seminars during Gordon Research Conference on "Intrinsically Disordered Proteins" Les Diablerets, Switzerland, from 30 June – 5 July, 2018 and gave a talk on

her work "Effect of Polyols on the Structure and Aggregation of Recombinant Human Gamma-Synuclein, An Intrinsically Disordered Protein". This focused conference brought in 80 prominent researchers from around the world in the areas of biophysics, cell biology, computational biology and structural biology to approach a series of questions surrounding intrinsically disordered proteins. She was also selected for the Centre for Biological Systems Engineering, Washington University, St. Louis award (CBSE award), to meet travel and registration expenses for participation.

Report on Zumba Fitness Camp

Shri Madabhushi Sridhar (Central Information Commissioner, Government of India), Prof. Parmeshwara Narayan Shastry (Vice Chancellor, Rashtriya Sanskrit Sansthan, Janakpuri, Delhi), Prof. Piyushkant Dixit (Vice Chancellor, Uttarakhand Sanskrit University, Haridwar), Padmashri Prof. Ramakant Shukla (President of Devavani Parishad) and Shri I Made Darmayasa (Bali, Indonesia) were the guests of valedictory session of the conference.

Sriman Dr. Yogendra Pratap Singh in his very attractive power point presentation focused on different aspects of Sri Rama in architectures, arts and stories available in the different corners of the world in the inaugural session. He said better

to involve school students as well in such seminars as they are the future researchers. Participants selected different texts for presentation like Ramayan, Champu Ramayan, Uttararamcharitam, Jain Ramayan (Paumcharia), Abhishek and Pratima Drama of Bhasha, Mahabharat, Yogavashishth, Anand Ramayan, Raghuvansha, Puran, Anargha Raghava of Murari, Mahavircharitam of Bhavbhuti, Sriramachandrodayam of Gopalaraya Kavi, etc. The conference ended with high applause from the audience and a group photo.

CSRD, Physical Geography Summer Field Survey

Students of the Centre for the Study of Regional Development (CSRD), Social of Social Sciences, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi conducted field survey in Physical Geography. This survey is a part of their curriculum of Post Graduate Master degree programme at CSRD. The major objectives of the field survey was to acquaint



students about the physical geography field survey techniques that are being used by the geographers worldwide to enquire about the physical setting of the landscape and landforms in the mountain area and their related geomorphology, ecology and environment by their personal observation and data collected through various geographical instruments and interaction with the local community and environment.

The Field Survey was conducted from 19 June, 2018 to 3 July, 2018 in the Kugti Wildlife Sanctuary (KWLS, Lat 32° 20′ N and 32° 35′ N and Long 76° 35′ E and 76° 55′ E; 3500 msl) covering Bharmour, Dughi Valley and Kugti Pass base camp. The Kugti Wildlife Sanctuary is located in the Pir Panjal



Range of Himalayas which lies in Tehsil-Bharmour, District Chamba, Himachal Pradesh. It represents the Biogeographical Zone 2A of North-Western Himalayas. KWLS covers an area of 379 sq kms and its altitude varies from 2400 m to 5000 m above mean sea-level and it touches the Lahul-Spiti District of Himachal Pradesh. The field survey was conducted under the guidance of Dr. Indrani Roy Chowdhary, Dr. Sanjeev Sharma and Dr. Rajesh Kumar. Later Prof. B.S. Marh (Professor of Geomorphology) from HP University, Shimla, Dr. M. Salariya (Sociologist) from Govt. Degree College, Chamba, and Dr. Bipne Rathore (Zoologist) joined as resource persons.



Enthusiastic students of CSRD had immense learning as per their aims and objectives set for survey. The major focus of the field survey was to study the geomorphology of the River Ravi in particular and its major tributaries (Budhil, Bhujla, Kugti nala, Dughi nalla etc.) in general, to learn how to carry out morphometric data collection of river channels as well as the understanding of landforms by physical observations. Not only that they learnt to use various morphometric instruments to collect ground observations. Further, students also collected information about the various flora/fauna and the impact of human interventions in the Kugti Wildlife Sanctuary. To know about the transhumance practices by the local Gaddi community and status of rising man-animal conflicts in the KWS.



The camping experience was new for all the students, as it was their first field survey tour to such a high altitude area where they also had the chance to live in such harsh climatic conditions. The camping site was located in the habitat of the Himalayan Black and Brown Bear. Students also had the chance to observe live incidence of man-animal conflicts when a Gaddi shepherd was attacked by a Himalayan Brown Bear. Students along with teachers and guides gave first aid to the victim in the far remote area which also saved the life of the shepherd. Local communities along with Gaddis were very thankful to CSRD, JNU students for providing immediate

help. Students learned how to respect nature and the local community. Lastly, they also learned how to develop coordination, leadership qualities and team spirit. It is expected that it will help in making them a good field geographer in near future.

Interview with **Prof. Satya R. Pattnayak**, Professor of Sociology and Political Science, Department of Sociology & Criminology, Department of Political Science, College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, Villanova University, USA



Aparaajita Pandey:
How would you
describe your
association with JNU
and your first
impressions of the
campus?

Prof. Pattnaik: It has

been a long time since I left JNU in 1980. I spent about 4 and a half years on JNU campus between 1976 and 1980. If I remember correctly, the first impression was memorable, since I had just come from Orissa, a state in the backwaters of India. The closeness of the relationship between professors and students impressed me the most.

Aparaajita Pandey: Why did you choose JNU for higher studies?

Prof. Pattnaik: I wanted to see the wider world for which I had to get out of Orissa. Those days, JNU, being the new kid on the bloc, had a greater reputation, compared to Delhi University. I, therefore picked JNU over Delhi University after I was accepted by both for an M.A. in Economics.

Aparaajita Pandey: What has been the trajectory of your career since you left JNU?

Prof. Pattnaik: After I finished my M.A. in Economics in 1978, I switched school and joined the Centre for American and West European Studies (that was the name those days) in SIS. But I focused on Latin America and US-Latin American relations.

Aparaajita Pandey: How has JNU impacted your multifaceted career?

Prof. Pattnaik: At JNU, Dr. R. Narayanan, a former Chair of the Centre and a former Dean of the School of International Studies, was my advisor and mentor. He contributed immensely to my growth as a research scholar and as a compassionate individual. I left for the US after I completed

my M.Phil in Latin American Studies. I subsequently completed by PhD in the US in international development and political economy. My PhD dissertation was a comparative statistical study of the impact of foreign investment and State Efficacy in Asia and Latin America.

Aparaajita Pandey: What has been the most challenging part of your work and why?

Prof. Pattnaik: After I completed my PhD in the US, I joined Villanova University in the state of Pennsylvania (in the Philadelphia metropolitan region) as an Assistant Professor. I have been there ever since and I have been promoted to Full Professor status since 2006. The challenging part is to stay productive in research and publish books and articles while teaching both undergraduate and graduate students in an American university. One has to be extremely organized with regard to time. I have been somewhat successful in that endeavor.


Aparaajita Pandey: Would you like to share any special memories that you associate with your time in JNU?


Prof. Pattnaik: As I said, it has been half a life since I left JNU in the Fall of 1980. But one of the best memories of JNU campus had always stayed with me: On some of the weekends, I played chess all night with friends, then, had breakfast in the morning, and went to sleep until 2pm the next afternoon.

Aparaajita Pandey: What would your message be to the readers of JNU NEWS and the students of JNU?

Prof. Pattnaik: Each person has to find an individual source of inspiration to be successful in JNU. For me it was this: Never forget that the central mission at JNU is to discover, uncover, and rediscover truth through research. Do not get caught up in the euphoria of short-term political ups and downs.






