


Bimonthly Journal of Jawaharlal Nehru University

In conversation with....

An Interview with Dr. S. Chandrasekaran, Co-ordinator (Evaluation), JNU



Wafa: What was your first impression of JNU and how would describe your experiences over the years here?

S. Chandrasekaran: First, I would like to thank JNU News for interviewing me even though after 15 years of joining JNU. JNU's reputation was already established before I joined

and it was and is a brand name. A chance to work here in one of the top positions is a dream for many.

Even a few months before joining, I did not have the slightest inkling that I would end up working in JNU. It was on the invitation of the then Vice Chancellor that I decided to appear before a Search Committee. The experience was challenging in itself and at first I was a little apprehensive whether I would be able to do justice to the post I had been offered. I was a scientist earlier at the Council for Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) and transferring from a scientist cadre to an administrative cadre posed a challenge for me but I am happy I took the chance.

The experience of working at JNU has been great in view of the responsibility of coordinating wide range academic activities such as Admissions, Evaluation, Fellowships, Endowments, Chairs, Project Administration, Planning, NAAC, International Collaboration, Recognized Institutions etc. Till a few years back I was also handling Faculty recruitment and the experience of interacting with experts from all over the world was amazing.

I have also been entrusted with the additional charge of the duties of Registrar and Librarian several times for prolonged periods. In fact, once I have also represented the Finance Officer in the Meeting of the Court to present Annual Accounts and Budget. I have also served a full tenure as the CVO of the University.

Wafa: What trajectory did your career take since when you were a student to becoming the Coordinator (Evaluation.) of JNU? Was there any difference in the working environments of other institutions you worked at in comparison to JNU?

S. Chandrasekaran: I was lucky enough to be the youngest in the family. Being the son of a school teacher who was known by everyone as "Maths Teacher", and with my elder brothers already settled in the academic line I had no pressure from my family to look for a job soon and was given the freedom to experiment. New approaches to disciplines always intrigued me and I was among the first batch of students to join the newly

started course called BSc Special Physics by Madurai University. Then, I studied MSc in Physics which was an intercollegiate course. After this I pursued M.Sc (Tech) Science Technology and Development Studies from BITS Pilani which was mainly aimed at the R & D management aspect of science dealing with the concerned policies. I was one of the 3 students in the first batch and we were mostly taught by Guest Lecturers from all over India. Besides the core courses, I studied a variety of foundation courses, Economics, History, Sociology, Computer Science and so on which provided me with an interdisciplinary approach from the start. Then, I worked in the Central Food Technological Research Institute (CFTRI) a CSIR lab in Mysore as a Senior Research Fellow for some time working on Vegetable Oil Industries which required a knowledge of not only the sciences but an idea of policy making as well. From there I moved to CSIR in Nov 1979 and joined the planning unit and worked as Scientist at different levels.. Later on CSIR sponsored my PhD as well in the area of R&D Planning. It was after this that I moved to JNU for a completely new job and experience. And for the last 15 years every day has been different and enriching.

I think every institution is different in terms of working environment. And with the kind of diverse posts I have worked on it wouldn't be fair to compare the experiences. The experience of being a scientist in CSIR working more in the field of Scientific Administration cannot be compared to what I do here. Here I am more accountable and answerable to more people. The freedom and autonomy you get as a student or a faculty is not available to an administrator. In such a position to work, you need the trust of the VC and the team which I have always got. As a scientist you can have a hypothesis and you can have success or failure at the end of it but in JNU I am responsible for the careers of thousands of students so there is absolutely no question of failure in any way. Thus, the responsibility is more because of the nature of my post but this challenge is the driving force for me and makes each day different.

Wafa: You coordinate admissions for JNU apart from other responsibilities. How has this particular facet changed over the years?

S. Chandrasekaran: When I joined in 1997 the number of applicants was around 35000 - 40,000 and the number of examination centres was 35 - 40 all over India. One of the first things I did was to make sure that we were able to reach out a larger mass of people. We conducted some studies and within the span of 2 years we increased the number of centres and as a result the number of applications also increased exponen-

tially. Now we have around 80 examination centres and the number of applicants is roughly 100,000. We made it a point that every state has at least one examination centre so that the students can reach the centres easily and they are more accessible.

We also found that many people were applying for more than one programme to keep more options open but because of this when a student got selected in more than one course of his choice a large number of seats used to go vacant and many students were deprived of the right to get admission on time. So we made a provision in the application form to facilitate the aspirants to apply up to 3 programmes at the same level and had to give a list of priorities which were available to all the centres and the university. The results were then synchronized so that the candidates name appear in only one of the select list. Efforts were made to fill up the reserved seats.

JNU also conducts examinations for Biotechnology for other colleges and Universities. This examination was earlier held 2 weeks after the usual JNU entrances which led to more expenditure, energy as well as required more resources. So, we made an effort to conduct them on the same days as other entrances increasing the efficiency. This also resulted in more number of students applying to the JNU Biotechnology programmes. JNU was the first University to upload the admit card on the internet. It is also one of the very few universities where the admission lists and the process, including examinations, take place roughly at the same time every year. JNU's "Admission Policy and Practice: For Equity, Access and Quality" has been lauded by the National Institute of Educational Planning and Administration (NIEPA- now NUEPA an University) for Best Practices in Higher Education; we were unique in introducing the Deprivation Points (Quartile points) for students who had studied their qualifying programmes from rural and less privileged areas so that they could compete with students from cities who have more exposure and facilities. JNU was able to admit large number of OBC Students by the system of deprivation points much before the Government implemented the reservation for OBC students.

Wafa: JNU is adopting e-governance and has made the admission process relatively hassle free for students. How difficult was it to implement this? Are there any other changes planned in this direction?

S. Chandrasekaran: We introduced online forms last year. We had been planning this for a while but due to various hurdles we couldn't implement it earlier. One thing I can say is that we have learned a lot. I wouldn't say that the process is perfect but we are trying our best to incorporate changes and learn from our experience and improve. Our admission process is very complex. Even for the same exam different students have different types of eligibility. We don't want to make the mistake of eliminating someone who might have been eligible. We are also trying to make the semester registration digitised. This is taking time because of the lack of data. But we started from January 2012 and we are improving. The number of folios has been reduced and folios are now available from a single window.

Wafa: Recently JNU was graded 3.91/4 by NAAC which in itself talks about the quality of education here. Where do you, as an administrator, think we should head from here?

S. Chandrasekaran: It is indeed a happy occasion for everyone in JNU that the process of Accrdidation by NAAC has been successfully completed. In fact, in the Year 2000, JNU was one of the first five Universities to be recognized by UGC as a University with Potential of Excellence (UPOE) and also got a special Grant under the Scheme.

JNU has now been rated the top with 3.91/4. Now we should aim for the maximum 4. Reaching the top is tough but sustaining that position is even tougher. NAAC arrives at the grading based on the data for the last 5 years and it is valid for the next five years. So what one has achieved has been accomplished gradually and not within a day. To keep this going the JNU ethos has to continue. Also, the deprived sections of the society cannot be ignored and all sections of the Society need to be included with the help of reservations as well as quartile points and this kind of uniqueness we need to maintain and couple it with good quality output. You need improvements everywhere every day. We cannot be content and need to aim for higher goals and continue to get the best faculty, the best students and the best staff and all of them need to work as a team. What makes JNU different is the opportunity for discussion and debate and that has to be maintained to foster a healthy intellectual environment. We should aim to figure not only in the National rankings but also among the top International Universities.

Wafa: Any particular memory you cherish of the 15 odd years you have been in JNU?

S. Chandrasekaran: There are many memories I have close to my heart.

The coordination work of organizing Special Convocations to confer "Honoris Causa" on Prof. Amratya Sen, Presidents of Russian Federation H.E. Mr.Vladimir V. Putin and H. E. Mr. Dimitry A. Medvedev, Prime Minister of Greece H.E. Mr. Constantine Simitis, Prime Minister of the Republic of Mauritious Dr. Navinchandra Ramgoolam and the time spent with these dignitaries are memorable events. Further, I was

very happy to contribute in the Institution of SYLFF fellowships funded by Nippon Foundation/Tokyo Foundation, Japan fellowships and Fox Fellowships of Yale University, USA.

The intellectual interaction with the experts in the Academic Committee meetings of the recognized Defence and Research Institutions and the respect one gets are something ever unforgettable.

Wafa: What is the message you would like to give to the JNU student community?

S. Chandrasekaran: JNU students are highly matured and very intelligent and I don't think they need any message. Even the NAAC expert peer team was very happy with the level of interaction they had with our students. Every member of JNU community has to work as a team to continue the model, JNU has set up and one has to keep the ethos of discussion and toleration for differences alive.

Anvaya is a workflow environment for automated genome analysis that provides an interface for several bioinformatics tools and databases, loosely coupled together in a coordinated system, enabling the execution of a set of analyses tools in series or in parallel. Unnoticed: The Children of JNU Construction Workers



Why? The beginning

There are some things that just can not be overlooked. It nags your conscience and pinches your whole notion of existence until you do something about it. Studying in this prestigious university, enjoying its beautiful environs and at the same time seeing a

certain section of kids denied the basic right to education right within the university was one such thing that made a group of students pause and take notice...and that's how Unnoticed was born. While many of us were working towards the goal of providing basic education to the children of the migrant construction workers inside the JNU campus, we recently formalized ourselves as Unnoticed: Children of JNU Construction Workers to effectively organize our activities.

What do we do? Our Activities

Initially emphasizing on basic teaching and organizing classes with student volunteers and later for that end getting the children admitted into nearby municipal schools, we realized that education is much more than textbooks and rote learning. Like any other child, these kids too were filled with immense potential which needed careful channeling and nurturing. With this intent, we began to diversify our activities. If amongst us, someone was good at crafts or painting or music or dance, we started teaching the kids the same. Theatre workshops, movie screenings and taking the children on recreational trips around the city became a part of our schedule. And the kids grew and we along with them.

Another area of work has been our vaccination drive. Being migrant workers on the move with no access to basic health facilities, almost all the children were without immunization against life threatening diseases. And we found a partner in Dr. Priyadarshini with whose help we were able to do some significant work in this field. Recently we found another support in Dr. Rewa who volunteered her services for the dental check up of the children. This and much more...such has been our journey so far.



Where, Who and How? Keeping it going

Starting with holding classes in open and at times at the workers settlement, to now using the International Students Association's office as our activity room, our driving energy is students. Be it our volunteers who are both Indian and international students studying in the university or ex-students who kept collaborating with us even though they do not live on JNU Campus anymore.

Erratic funding has been our simple way to carry on our activities so far. Recently, we have been particularly lucky, since the attention of more and more people has focused on our organization. Claudia Landes, a primary school teacher in Germany, mother of Paula Landes, ex-casual student in JNU, started an intense collaboration with us. She has been raising funds from Germany thanks to interesting workshops about India she held with her pupils. Thanks to her contribution, on the 28 of July 2012, we could accompany the children to Purana Qila, where they could enjoy the famous evening laser show about enchanting the greatness of Delhi's history.

Also the Delegation of the European Union to India has been interested in our work and donated five computers to Unnoticed.

Seminar/Conference

International Seminar on Reflection of Indian Culture and Civilisation in Travelogues

The inauguration of the seminar was held at the JNU Convention Centre, Jawaharlal Nehru University. Dr. Mazhar Mehdi Husain conducted the proceedings of the inaugural session of the Seminar Prof Krishnaswami Nachimuthu, Chairperson, Centre of Indian Languages, JNU, welcomed the delegates, participants and the audience. Dr Khwaja Md Ekramuddin, Director of the Seminar, introduced the theme of the international seminar.

He noted that the seminar was hosting seventeen participants from Bangladesh, Pakistan, Iran, Turkey, Sweden, Cyprus, and over 30 participants from various parts of India. He said that the purpose of holding the Seminar was of course an academic interaction to stress on Indian Culture and Civilization at the primary level and the discussion on the genre of travelogue at the secondary level. Indian Culture and Civilization is very ancient and has its continuity through the ages. Ever since the time of the Mahabharata down to the present days both foreigners and Indians have written valuable accounts of India in the form of travelogue. The culture, which has evolved in the subcontinent is marked by various hues and colours, diverse patterns of life in which religions have played a vital role. Through Hinduism, the philosophy of Vedanta spread from the Himalayas to the Indian

Ocean, Buddhism carried the message of noble path to the Far East China and Japan, Islam brought egalitarian values of humanity to the people of India, Sikhism synthesized all the major religions of India and the Sufis and the Saints fostered love and fraternity among the people of the subcontinent. The Christian Missionaries bridged the East and the West by means of western education and the English language.

He then said that writers of travelogue – Magesthenes, Fa Hein, Alberuni, Ibne Batuta, Bernier, Quratul Ain Hyder, William Dalryple and a host of others exclaimed,- It is Incredible India. He hoped that the participants from India and abroad would help the DISCOVERY OF INDIA in the three days.

Mr Syed Mohammad Ashraf, an eminent writer and educationist, appreciated the efforts of Centre of Indian Languages to hold the international event. He explained the importance of travel in Islamic culture and civilisation. Adam was the first traveler who traveled a great distance between heaven and earth and guoted the couplets of Igbal in which he alluded to the travel of Adam. Similarly in Jewish tradition the travel of Moses and the Jews to escape the tyranny of Pharaoh by crossing the Nile was an event of great travel of the nation. Prof Dipti S Tripathi, Director of NMM, New Delhi graced the occasion as guest of honour and she referred to the travel of Clouds in Meghduta of Kalidas and emphasized the importance of the travelogue literature as a medium to reflect Indian culture and civilisation. The chief guests, Prof Halil Tokar and Prof Amir Zikrgoo, also expressed their appreciation for the efforts of the Centre of Indian Languages in holding the event. The presidential address of the seminar was delivered by Perween Hasan, Vice Chancellor, Central Women's University, Dhaka, Bangladesh. Prof Hasan expressed her pleasure that Jawaharlal Nehru University has been building academic and cultural contacts by inviting delegates from neighboring countries such as Bangladesh, Pakistan, Iran, Malaysia etc. She said that huge sea, vast desert and great forests could not keep man from undertaking long travels and journeys through out history. Man is more blessed today than at any point of time in history when he can travel by air within two hours of a journey which he used to travel in one year. Travelogue is indeed a good medium to see the globe or any part thereof. The vote of thanks was delivered by Prof Janabade who mentioned the suffers of the sponsors thanked the delegated individually and collectively and all expressed gratitude of the centre to all the sponsors such as Ministry of Culture, Government of India; Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India, ICCR and Ministry of Tourism, Government of India.

There were 14 academic sessions of the seminar a special session was arranged on Indian Culture and Civilisation through the Eyes of Sufis and Saints which was co-ordinated by Dr Syed Akhtar Husain. The Dr Khwaja Md Ekramddin welcomed, guest of honour, Sri Subodh Kant Sahay, Minister of Tourism, Government of India and all the speakers of the session. The inaugural address was delivered by Prof Anand Kimar, a noted sociologist and popular faculty member of Jawaharlal Nehru University. Prof. Anand emphasized the need of organizing the seminar on the above theme in order to bring to light the role of Sufis and saints in looking at the cultural diversity of India. Sri Sahay praised the efforts of Centre of Indian Languages in highlighting the Indian culture and civilisation through travelogues a work in which the Ministry of Tourism, Govt of India is engaged. The presidential address was delivered by H.H. Syed Mohammad Qasim Ashraf Sahab of Kachaucha Sharif. He was highly impressed by the interest of Jawaharlal Nehru University in the study of Sufism and the efforts of Centre of Indian Languages to develop harmony among the people by showcasing the diversity of Indian culture and civilisation which was developed by the Sufis through the ages. He admitted that Arabic, Persian, Urdu, Hindi, English and almost all the Indian languages have a good amount of Indian cultural legacy in their literary corpus and it is the obligation of the Centre of Indian Languages to study them and make them of public interest. Dr Rizwanur Rahman proposed a vote of thanks to the chair and expressed his gratitude to all the scholars and participants of the three-day international seminar. The seminar came to its conclusion in the valedictory session in which H H Mr Tarig Ahmad Karim, High Commissioner of Bangladesh at New Delhi delivered his valedictory address.

Conference cum Workshop Jointly organized by SCIS -JNU & ICGEB on "Search for Antimalarials: Mechanism Based Approach"

The inaugural lecture was delivered by Dr Vinod Prakash Sharma which threw light on figures and facts related to malaria in India. After that Dr Chetan Chitnis showed how parasite proteins EBA175 and PfRh2a/b localized in parasite oraganelles micronemes and rhoptries facilitate erythrocyte invasion by malarial parasite when they are exposed to low K+ environment. Another speaker Dr Y.D. Sharma gave a lecture on emergence of a new mutation in dihydropteroate synthatase enzyme associated with antifolate drug resistance in Plasmodium falciparum parasite population in tsunami affected Nicobar Island. Dr Pawan Malhotra's talk was about novel extracellular secretory antigens at asexual blood stages of Plasmodium falciparum and their role(s) in albumin uptake, thermal tolerance as well as immune modulation. Dr. Aparup Das's lecture was mostly on utility of evolutionary genomic tools in malaria public health. His talk focussed on evolutionary study (genome comparison, association and phenotypic characterization) of genomes of malaria parasites, hosts and

vectors to identify the regions of genome that may be important for targeting in Indian malaria domain. Dr Asif Mohammed from ICGEB shed light on prokaryotic and cyanobacterial ATPdependent protease machineries in Plasmodium falciparum asnovel drug targets. His group has identified ATP dependent proteases in P. falciparum ClpQY (prokaryotic protease) and ClpAP (cyanobacterial protease) as potential drug targets whose functional characterization proves that these are essential for parasite survival. Dr Anil K Saxena'e talk was mostly on application of ligand and structure based approaches in the design of novel antimalarials. His group developed pharmacophore models for determining the essential structural requirements for antimalarial activity from the substituted 1,2,4-trioxanes. To the model, five substituted 1,2,4-trioxanes were synthesized and screened for antimalarial activity suggesting that model may be useful for designing new antimalarial drugs. Also his group developed pharmacophore model for the plasmodium FAS-II using seven highly active flavanoids. Dr Dinesh Gupta lectured about development of novel lead like compounds of $20S \beta$ subunit, a threonine peptidase using ligand based (Support Vector Machines) and receptor based (molecular docking) techniques. Dr Hemalatha Balaram gave an interesting lecture about

Workshop on "Equal Opportunities"

The Equal Opportunity Office, JNU and School of Language, Literature and Culture Studies, jointly organized a two day workshop on "Equal Opportunities".

The workshop was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor of JNU, Prof SK Sopory and was attended by the Chief Advisor, EOO, JNU, Prof. Sonajharia Minz, Chief Advisor, EOC, DU, Dr. Chandra Nisha Singh, the Dean, SLL&CS, Prof. RN Menon, and Prof. Valerian Rodrigues of CPS, SSS, JNU, who gave the keynote address. This session was attended by nearly 150 participants from various categories of different centres of the School.

Welcoming the official members of the JNU community, faculty SLL&CS and the students, the coordinator Remedial Courses, SLL&CS, Dr. Meeta Narain appraised the house of the need and importance of organizing such a workshop and introduced the

crosstalk between purine nucleotide metabolism and mitochondrial pathways in Plasmodium falciparum. In P. falciparum, purine nucletides synthesis pathway consumes a molecule of aspartate and release ammonia and fumarate. Her current work has established through radiolabeled tracers and NMR spectroscopy that fumarate is metabolized to aspartate and pyruvate and fumarate hydratase, malate guinone oxidoreductase and aspartate aminotransferase are involved in this process, making them potential drug targets. Dr Swati Patankar work was on translation initiation site choice in Plasmodium. Falciparum by using genome analysis and glutathione peroxidise. Her work was shown to predict a correct start codon or translation initiation site with high specificity and sensitivity. Dr Pushkar Sharma's lecture was on Plasmodium kinome in which he highlighted around-70 protein kinases as important drug targets. Dr Suman Dhar from JNU focussed on a potential drug target for human malarial parasite Plasmodium falciparum from apicoplast, DNA Gyrase. Dr Dhanasekaran Shanmugan showed us the TDR Targets database: A chemo-genomic resource for target prioritization and association with inhibitory small molecules. Dr Ajay K Saxena talk was on structure and mechanism of malaria transmission blocking vaccine candidate P25 and P28 Proteins. Dr Prasad V. Bharatam from NIPER, Mohali talked on reaction mechanism as well as molecular mechanism studies in the design of Pf DHFR Inhibitors. MD simulation and in vivo studies are being carried out for two promising leads. Dr Srinivasan Sundararaj lecture was on mechanism of activation and inhibition of cysteine proteases of Plasmodium falciparum. Lectures given by various speakers were informative and there was very effective speaker to students discussion which fulfilled the purpose of the workshop cum conference.

themes to be covered during the two days of the workshop. She mentioned that this was the first workshop on "Equal Opportunities" to be jointly organized by EOO and SLL&CS and thanked the august panel for their support and encouragement

towards the organization of this workshop for the benefit of the students.

She further emphasized the fact that the SLL&CS has taken up the initiative to organize Remedial Classes in different centres as the first step towards upgradation. The workshop concentrated on the structure and content of these courses and how to make them beneficial for the students. She also informed that many centres of the school, CRS, CA&AS, CJK&NEAS, CC&SEAS, CF&FS, CGS and Centre of Spanish, Portuguese, Italian & Latin American Studies are already in the process of conducting these courses and devising different methods for making them beneficial for the students' community. The centres are also working upon methods to make these courses a part of curriculum to be followed from the beginning of the semester.

The Vice-Chancellor congratulated the School for taking up this initiative and appealed to the students to take advantage of these courses. He also discussed different devices which can be adopted to further enhance this scheme in the form of special lectures, discussions and tutorial classes to raise the standards of the students of all classes of society.

The Dean, SLL&CS endorsed the views of the Vice-Chancellor and also informed of how some centres of School like the CGS and Centre of English Studies have successfully been experimenting different modules of remedial classes which can be followed by other centres too.

The Chief Advisor, EOO of JNU spoke of devices to be adopted of how to promote such workshops on a wider spectrum by collaborating with other schools of the university, so as to have an inter-disciplinary approach towards these courses. The EOC of DU gave a brief report on the functioning of this cell in different colleges of DU and how different aspects of Equal Opportunities have been added to remedial classes (special classes for physically handicapped and visually challenged) so that the cell covers a wider section of the students' community. Prof. Valerian Rodrigues of CPS, SSS, delivered the key-note address by giving an interesting and exhaustive picture of the importance, need and structure of Equal Opportunities at a National Level. He emphasized on the difficulties faced by the students coming from backward classes and how they can cope up with others. He suggested remedies and structural changes which can be adopted at college/university levels where there is mass interaction between the students. This was followed by an interesting question answer session and possibilities of expansion of this scheme. The session ended by the vote of thanks delivered by Dr. Ravikesh of CJK&NEAS.

The workshop was divided into language specific lectures where the participating centres formulated their time table according to the need of their students. The CRS had about 25 participants, CA&AS - 15, CF&FS - 5, CC&SEAS - 50, and CJK&NEAS - 15 participants. The concluding session was the round table discussion which was attended by the Chief Advisor, EOO, Prof. Sonajharia Minz and the Advisor EOO Dr. Neelima Mondal, who welcomed suggestions and discussed the possibilities of expanding and popularizing such courses. The students' community attended in large number and came up with their view points. The agenda for the future was adopted which emphasized on the extension of remedial courses to include workshops/weekly lecture series and search for native speakers through further interaction with embassies for enhancement of competence in foreign languages.

The workshop was indeed a success since there was a unanimous support to the need of conducting such courses and improving them. The workshop ended by the concluding remarks and thanks by the Coordinator Remedial Courses, SLL&CS, who assured the EOO of their consistent efforts towards promoting this scheme of the government and sharing their responsibility for the same.

Seminar on Rethinking Policy Innovations and Research Questions for Revitalizing Rainfed India

The Centre for Studies in Science Policy - Economics Research Unit (CSSP-ERU) of Jawaharlal Nehru University organized the Seminar on Rethinking Policy Innovations and Research Questions for Revitalizing Rainfed India on 5 May, 2012 at the Convention Centre of JNU. The seminar was organized as a part of the research project "Socio-economic Study of Rainfed Agriculture and Low Input Animal Husbandry in India", initiated by Centre for Studies in Science Policy of School of Social Sciences and supported by Ford Foundation.

The whole-day event was started with a roundtable discussion on Policy Dimensions for Revitalizing Rainfed India. Prior to this roundtable, Professor V.V. Krishna of CSSP, and Dr. Rohan D'Souza, Project Director, CSSP-ERU briefly introduced the ongoing project's objectives, its achievements and research findings. Dr. Kaustav Banerjee, Co-ordinator, CSSP-ERU briefly introduced the background of this seminar.

He informed the audience that CSSP-ERU has been set up with the mandate to evolve policy instruments for directing public investments to rainfed agricultural strategies and low-input animal husbandry. In effect, the CSSP-ERU has attempted to frontally address the skewed nature of existing public investment patterns in which rainfed areas (as opposed to perennial irrigated zones) and low input husbandry (as opposed to highinput) receive inadequate policy attention and in part causing



the continued aggravation of regional economic imbalances. This Seminar aimed at bringing together academics and planners for a deliberation on the path ahead for rainfed India in the 12th Five Year Plan.The deliberations of this seminar would lead to raising critical policy issues and research questions by arguing for decisive restructuring public investment regimes in India, which can yield positive economic outcomes in agriculture, animal husbandry and fishery.

Professor S.K. Sopory, Vice Chancellor of JNU chaired this roundtable session. In his speech, he introduced how green revolution succeeded with the help of advance technologies. Similarly, revitalizing rainfed agriculture also requires intervention of appropriate technologies and biotechnologies. Professor Abhijit Sen (Member, Planning Commission), Dr. Peter Kenmore (Country Representative India, Food and Agriculture Organization FAO); Dr. N.K. Sanghi (Revitalizing Rainfed Agriculture Network) and Dr. Rajeswari S. Raina (Senior Scientist, NISTADS) were lead discussants in this roundtable session. Professor Abhijit Sen pointed out how food security can be achieved in a diverse country like India, when effectively integrating all systems of agriculture and animal husbandry. He also introduced roadmap for policy neglect rainfed areas during the 12th Five Year Plan period. Dr. Peter Kenmore spoke about international best practices and policy interventions in different developing countries for different agricultural situations.

In this Seminar, two post-lunch sessions were held with the theme Research Questions for Revitalizing Rainfed India. In the Session One, three papers were presented: Comparative poverty analysis of rainfed India by Dr. Himanshu of JNU; Spatio-temporal analysis of rainfed India: some issues by Dr. Milap Punia of JNU, and Interlocked nature of agriculturenutrition pathways in rainfed areas by Dr. Kaustav Banerjee of CSSP. Professor Pranav Desai of CSSP chaired Session One. In the Session Two, three papers were presented: Research guestions in rainfed agriculture by Dr. P. S. Vijay Shankar of Samaj Pragati Sahayog (SPS); Energy costs of agricultural practices in rainfed areas by Dr. Nandan Nawn of NUJS; and Decadal analysis of green revolution and policy issues for rainfed India by Aditi Poddar of CSSP. Dr. Rohan D'Souza chaired the final session. These two sessions concluded with vibrant discussion and information flow from the audience.

Lecture on "Enabling Open Scholarship: Open Access Policies, Issues and Resources"

The JNU Central Library organized the sixth lecture in the JNU Library Lecture Series and Outreach Programme on 29 June 2012. The Lecture titled "Enabling Open Scholarship: Open Access Policies, Issues and Resources for Higher Education Institutions" was delivered by Dr. Usha Mujoo Munshi, Chief Librarian of Indian Institute of Public Administration, New Delhi, and a Fulbright Scholar. Dr. Ramesh Chandra Gaur, University Librarian of JNU introduced the speaker to the audience. Professor Andrew M. Lynn of CIS Division, JNU chaired this event. In his remarks, Professor Lynn admired the new open access initiatives of JNU Central Library, e.g., Electronic Theses and Dissertations (ETD) Repository and JNU Institutional Repository. He also mentioned that JNU is part of CSIR's Open Source Drug Discovery project, where significant amount of research literature is now available in open access mode.

In this lecture Dr. Munshi first introduced the concept of open access to knowledge and open scholarship. Open access to knowledge refers to provisioning free and universal access to research literature. Several research funding agencies across

the world support open access to make research results freely available to larger audience without any access barrier. Open access movement has gained momentum worldwide in last one decade. Several open access declarations and open access mandates make research institutions free to choose publishing research papers in open access journals, and/ or archive research literature in open access institutional or subjectspecific repositories. Berlin Declaration on Open Access to Knowledge in the Sciences and Humanities is one such declaration signed by 383 research organizations, including Indian National Science Academy. Several Indian science academies and institutions have adopted open access mode of publishing. Leading Indian academic journal publishers, such as Indian National Science Academy (INSA), Indian Academy of Sciences, and National Institute of Science Communication and Information Resources (NISCAIR) have already made all their journals freely accessible online. These journals continue publishing print editions, without loosing any print subscribers. Whereas, commercial publishers have increased manifolds their price of journals in last few years. This makes most international academic journals, published by commercial



publishers, unaffordable to institutions in developing countries. Open access journals, thus, have more potential to stay and grow. A significant number of open access journals are also covered in Web of Science, Scopus and other wellknown citation and bibliographic databases. Their credibility has already been established among subject experts and research communities.

The Lecture concluded with Chair's remarks and an exciting interaction with the audience. Audience was particularly interested to know the funding sources for publishing in open access journals, which follow author-pay model. Professor Lynn informed the audience that certain Indian institutions and research projects have such provision. Dr. Gaur introduced JNU Central Library's new e-scholarship initiatives and how JNU academic community would participate. He concluded this lecture session with vote of thanks.

'सूफियों ने देश की बहुरंगी संस्कृति की पैराकारी की'

सूफी साहित्य के जरिये से भारतीय संस्कृति और सभ्यता को जानना उन लोगों को जानने का एक प्रयास है, जिनकी हम वास्तविक संताने हैं और जिनके नजरिये को हम समाज को बेहतर बनाने का नजरिया मानते हैं। यह विचार जाने–माने समाजशास्त्री और जेएनयू के प्रो. आनंद कुमार ने भारतीय भाषा केन्द्र की ओर से आयोजित 'यात्रा साहित्य में अभिव्यक्त भारतीय सभ्यता और संस्कृति' विषयक संगोष्ठी के दूसरे दिन 'सूफियों और संतों के नजरिये से भारतीय सभ्यता और संस्कृति' विषयक विशेष सत्र में व्यक्त किये। प्रो. कुमार ने इस सत्र का उद्घाटन भाषण देते हुए कहा कि भक्ति आंदोलन के सूफी संतों ने लोगों में मानवता और प्रेम का संदेश दिया। नानक, निजामुद्दीन, खुसरो, जायसी, चैतन्य, कबीर, रैदास आदि संत हिंसा, सांप्रदायिक नफरत आदि के खिलाफ खड़े हुए और इस देश की बहुरंगी संस्कृति और सभ्यता की पैरोकारों की। यह संगोष्ठी इस संदर्भ में एक बड़ा अवसर है। संगोष्ठी में मुख्य अतिथि के रूप में बोलते हुए भारत सरकार के पर्यटन मंत्री सुबोधकांत सहाय ने कहा कि मुझे इस संगोष्ठी का हिस्सा बनते हुए गर्व महसूस हो रहा है। उन्होंने कहा कि पर्यटन मंत्री होने के नाते मुझे यह पता है कि भारत में अधिकांश पर्यटक सांस्कृतिक विशिष्टता से आकृष्ट होकर आते हैं। हमारी विविधतायुक्त और कई साल पुरानी संस्कृति उन्हें आकृष्ट ही नहीं करती है, बल्कि अपील भी करती है। इस सेमिनार के द्वारा भारतीय इतिहास के उक्त उजले पक्ष पर प्रकाश डाला जाना एक सकारात्मक पहल है।

इसी सत्र में स्वीडन के उपासला विश्वविद्यालय की प्रोफेसर शोकोफेह टागी ने कहा कि भारत मानवता के इतिहास में एक बहुत बड़ा देश है और यह कहा जा सकता है कि भारत साहित्य और सभ्यता की जननी है। भारत के इस महत्वपूर्ण स्थान को पाने में सूफियों और संतों का महत्वपूर्ण स्थान रहा है। बदायूं के उसैदुल हक कादरी ने कहा कि सूफी संतों ने जो तालिम पेश की, वही सच्ची इस्लामी संस्कृति है। इस्लामी संस्कृति का तालुक्कात नफरत फैलाने वालों से कतई नहीं है। आगे उन्होंने भारत की मुस्तरका तहजीब में सुफियों के योगदान को रेखांकित किया। इंटरनेशनल इस्लामिक यूनिवर्सिटी मलेशिया की प्रोफेसर लैला ताजेर ने ईरान के मशहूर लेखक मीर फिनादिरास्की की भारत यात्रा के बारे में बताते हुए कहा कि वो भारत इसलिए आए थे क्योंकि यहाँ विचारों की आजादी और अभिव्यक्ति की आजादी थी और उस समय के ईरान में ऐसा नहीं था। जाम–ए–नूर के संपादक खुश्तर नूरानी ने कहा कि सूफियों ने भारत को दो महान चीज़ें दी, एक तो उर्दू भाषा और दूसरी भारत की मुश्तरका संस्कृति। उन्होंने कहा कि उर्दू किसी एक मजहब की भाषा नहीं है, बल्कि यह हिन्दुस्तान की एक जबान है, जिसका धर्म से कोई वास्ता नहीं है।

इस सत्र का अध्यक्षीय वक्तव्य देते हुए कचौचा शरीफ के सैयद मोहम्मद कासिम अशरफ साहब ने कहा कि सूफियों ने जिन्दगी जीने के तरीके बताये और उन्होंने भारत की गंगा–जमुनी मुस्तरका तहरीक को आगे बढ़ाते हुए अमन की तामिल दी और अपने तौर—तरीकों से लोगों का दिल जीत लिया। उन्होंने कहा कि सूफियों के द्वारा दी हुई शिक्षाएं आज भी हमारे लिए बेशकीमती हैं और उनकी राह पर चल कर हम हमेशा एक रह पाएंगे। कार्यक्रम के प्रारंभ में सेमिनार के निदेशक डॉ. ख्वाजा मोहम्मद इकरामूद्दीन ने स्वागत भाषण पेश करते हुए कहा कि भारत की विविधतायुक्त संस्कृति और साजी विरासत को समझने के लिए सूफियों को जानना–समझना आवश्यक है। वे आज भी हमें राह दिखाते हैं। सेमिनार के अन्य सत्रों में प्रो. अली जावेद, प्रो. शंकर बसु, प्रो. परवीन हसन, डॉ. मुश्ताक हैदर, डॉ. संजीव दुबे, डॉ. जेशन तब्बसुब, डॉ. फरजानेह आजम लोत्फी, डॉ. मुजफर आलम, डॉ. परमिंदर सिंह भोगल, डॉ. गोविंद प्रसाद, डॉ. रमण प्रसाद सिंहा, डॉ. मोहम्मद बबूल कावेसेर, डॉ. रंजना बनर्जी, डॉ. रूपा सिंह, डॉ. आर. बालॉकृष्णन, डॉ. अनवर पाशा, डॉ. एन. चन्द्रशेखरन, डॉ. देवेन्द्र चौबे, डॉ. तंजीमूल फिरदौस, डॉ. सलीम शाजाद, डॉ. वफा याज्दामानेश, डॉ. जमील असगर, डॉ. आनंद शुक्ला, डॉ. नूरीन खान आदि विद्वानों ने भागीदारी की।

Prachin Yunan: Itihas Aur Sanskriti, by Professor Udai Prakash Arora

The book Prachin Yunan: Itihas Aur Sanskriti authored by Professor Udai Prakash Arora was released by Eminent Indologist Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan. Prof. S.K. Sopory, Vice Chancellor, JNU, New Delhi presided over the function. Mr. Konstatinos Moastos, Charge d'affairs, Greek Embassy, New Delhi and Prof. S.P. Gautam, Vice Chancellor, M.J.P. Rohilkhand University, Bareilly were Guests of Honour. Mr. Mangalesh Dabral, Eminent Hindi litterateur was also present.

Welcoming the eminent scholars, guests and students present, Prof. Shankar Basu, former Dean, School of Language, Literature and Culture Studies, expressed happiness on the release of book and congratulated the author for his remarkable academic work in the field of Greek Studies.

Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan, chief guest, praised the efforts of the author to present an unbiased study of the two representative cultures of East and West and to handle senstivities involved in such a work with great craft. She emphasized the importance of Greek Studies to the Indian scholarship as studies not only in the field of Humanities and Social-Sciences but also analysis of our own Indian culture can not be well comprehended without sound knowledge of Classical Greek Studies. In



concluding three chapters of the book, Dr. Saha found an excellent analysis of Greek mind by the author. The last chapter is one of most informative chapters ever written on cultural relationship of ancient India and Greece. Dr. Saha congratulated the author and publisher both for their valuable contribution to the Greek studies in Hindi language.

Mr. Konstantinos Moastos, Charge d'affairs, Greek Embassy, New Delhi shared his views stating that Greece and India had a common vision for a diversified yet complementary thought process for the betterment of human life. Interaction between Indian and Greek culture has enriched philosophy, science and arts since antiquity. He expressed happiness over the work done by Prof. Arora as Greek Chair Professor at Jawaharlal Nehru University and wished that more studies and exchange programmes will take place between India and Greece under the aegis of JNU, New Delhi.

An interview with Geeta Gouri, Member, Competition Commission of India, New Delhi



Wafa: When and how did your association with JNU begin? What were your first impressions about this university?

Geeta Gouri: I joined Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) as Doctoral scholar in 1971, the year JNU became fully functional. At that time JNU represented the high ideals of our first Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru after whom the

University was named.

It is difficult to put in words what this new University meant to us, but by and large most of us joined JNU as it represented new and fresh initiative in higher education. The emphasis was on change in every sphere and walk of life.

My first impression of the University was the air of freshness and optimism which generated positive energy.

Wafa: How would you describe your years at JNU? Have you visited JNU recently?

Geeta Gouri: At the young impressionable age that one joined JNU exposure to several concepts and ideas combined with the rigor of economics that our faculty insisted on kept us on an intellectual high. The hallmark of JNU is that it is Pan Indian and the mixing of different people from different regions and different backgrounds gave a bird's eye view of multi-cultural India.

Recently I was invited by the Vice Chancellor of JNU to a gathering of distinguished alumni to interact with the team of experts of National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC).

Wafa: How has JNU shaped your perception in relation to your

profession? Do you think JNUites do things differently in your field?

Geeta Gouri: As stated earlier the scope provided for meeting people from different parts of India and understanding their sensibility combined with the fact that JNU is intellectually and politically very alive helped me to develop an understanding of diverse views and to appreciate the diversity. In my profession as an economist in the regulatory area the interchange of new ideas and divergent views is essential.

I think the JNUities, especially the initial batches, came with the ambition of making a difference in whichever profession they entered. It was not a career that we aspired for but rather to be harbingers of change. With pride I can state we have made a difference in whatever paths of our careers took.

Wafa: What was the trajectory that your career took after you left JNU? How is JNU different from various other institutions you have been a part of (if at all you think it is)

Geeta Gouri: Initially I taught in Lady Shri Ram College Delhi University after which my career took different turns as we shifted from Delhi to Hyderabad in 1980. It was really in Hyderabad at the Institute of Public Enterprises I had the opportunity of interacting with some exceptional people. Their perception on economic policies helped in shaping my understanding of economics and its applicability, looking at Government policies and of developing my understanding as a professional economist.

Later I joined IDBI at the training Institute Jawaharlal Nehru Institute for Development Banking (JNIDB). The tenure in a development bank, provided different insights in the financial world from the real world. Later I joined the Andhra Pradesh

Electricity Regulatory Commission in Hyderabad (APERC) in 2000. In 2009 I joined Competition Commission of India, New Delhi as Member. By and large my career has been as a economist covering areas of regulatory economics, energy, policy analysis.

JNU was an unique experience. Unique in terms of interdisciplinary courses offered. Located in Delhi the University attracted talented students, erudite scholars not only as part of faculty or students but the larger intellectual body that the capital tends to attract in comparision to other cities. On comparing JNU with Bangalore University where I did my graduation and postgraduation Bangalore University especially Central College was also very unique and has produced several high caliber intellectuals. I feel Bangalore University was perhaps more open and liberal than JNU. It may have been on account of the location of these two universities, one in a 'sarkari city' the other in a cosmopolitan city forerunner of a globalized flat world.

Wafa: Tell us a little bit about the Competition Commission of India and its involvement in providing a medium between the market, economic growth and the consumer needs. What is the role you currently play as a Member in the Commission?

Geeta Gouri: The Competition Commission of India (CCI) is the market regulator. Markets to function effectively and to ensure that the benefits of competition reach one and all they need to be regulated. Regulation of markets under economic reforms is very different from the early form of direct intervention and licensing. Competition is now universally acknowledged as the best means of ensuring that consumers, even more so the 'aam adami' or 'common man' have access to the broadest range of services at the most competitive prices. Producers will have maximum incentive to innovate, reduce their costs and meet consumer expectations / demand. Competition thus promotes allocative and productive efficiency, thus stimulating economic growth. This requires healthy market conditions and governments across the globe are increasingly trying to remove market imperfections through appropriate regulations to promote competition.

Perhaps, the role of the Commission is aptly summarized in the preamble to the Competition Act (2002):

An Act to provide, keeping in view of the economic development of the country, for the establishment of a Commission to prevent practices having adverse effect on competition, to promote and sustain competition in markets, to protect the interests of consumers and to ensure freedom of trade carried on by other participants in markets, in India, and for matters connected therewith or incidental thereto

The Commission is a quasi-judicial body with powers to impose monetary penalty. The recent DFF Order and the Cartel case of cement manufacturers have helped Commission establish its presence as an active and pro-market regulator. There are broadly three areas of intervention: Anti-competitive agreements which, among other things include cartels; Abuse of Dominance and Merger and Acquisition. As you may note the Competition Law is primarily an economic law and as Member (Economics) economic analysis of all cases have to be undertaken and issues examined as to whether competition is affected. Principles for defining market both relevant product market and relevant geographic market have to be developed. Another facet of examining competitiveness of a market and competition is that of 'consumer harm'. In India economics of competition law is still a new area.

Wafa: Which aspect of JNU did you love the most when you were a student here? Any particular memories that you would like to share?

Geeta Gouri: Hostel life is always the most interesting and memorable. Every evening there were group meetings, music sessions, discussions after dinner, all voluntary which made life colorful.

I guess for all of us it was really the Students' Union Election which brought to the forefront JNU's colour. Singing sessions both in the hostel and with Shri Anil Biswas were memorable. I met my husband in JNU, Prof Rajen Harshe who became the first Vice Chancellor when University of Allahabad attained its central status.

Wafa: Is there anything in your life which can be dedicated to JNU?

Geeta Gouri: Positive thinking and striving for excellence as exemplified by my teacher Prof. Ashok Sanjay Guha.

Wafa: What message would you like to give to the present JNU student community?

Geeta Gouri: You cannot rest on the laurels of your seniors. JNU must rise to meet the cutting edge required to join the league of International Universities.
