**Course Title** : Great Power Interest in Central Asia during the Twentieth

Century

Course type : Optional

**Contact Hours** : 2 hours per week.

Course Objectives: This course provides an understanding of the British, Russian, Soviet and Chinese policies in Central Asia during the twentieth century covering the Tsarist Russian rule, Soviet regime and the post-Soviet independence period. The course discusses the Soviet policies in Central Asia (1917-1991), new geo-politics following the disintegration of former USSR and the subsequent great power strategies in the region. The course also evaluates the implications of the changing scenario, including in the Af-Pak region for both Central Asia and India.

**Learning Outcomes:** Students would get a holistic view of the developments in the entire region from the Caspian Sea in the west to Tien Shan in the east, encompassing the whole of Central Asia, Xinjiang, Tibet, Mongolia and Afghanistan. By the end of the course the students would have an understanding of the history, politics and economics of the region from past till the present.

**Evaluation Methods:**Mid-Term tests, assignments- 50%;End Semester-50% Examination
