Course Objectives: The Course deals with the economy of the five Central Asian countries and the political economy of their regional cooperation. It begins with the theoretical approaches to understand regional cooperation by discussing examples from different regions. To understand Central Asia the course begins with its geographical characteristics, natural resources like Oil and Gas, initiatives by the individual countries to harness the resources. It discusses the interests and involvement of the extra-regional countries in harnessing the natural resources in Central Asia. The student would learn about the initiaves taken by the Central Asian countries towards their economic development through regional cooperation, how politics within the countries and region impacts their decisions and outcomes.
