Objective: The Arab world has a rich history of philosophical, socio-cultural and political debates. Going back to classical poetry in the pre-Islamic era to the advancement of ideas during the medieval period and the literary awakening after encounters with modernity, Arab intellectuals have engaged philosophical and topical issues from different dimensions. The course aims to give students ideas and tools for creative and critical engagement with the contemporary Arab world. For a student to grasp the nuances of the ideological, political and cultural transformations in the Arab world, an understanding of the intellectual traditions in the Arab world is of utmost necessity.

Learning Outcomes: The course seeks to enable the students to engage critically with intellectual debates in the Arab world, appreciate the history of ideas, develop an understanding of contemporary Arab intellectual thought, engage with feminist and civil society discourses on democratisation and critically evaluate the creative expressions through popular culture.

Course Structure

- **I. Intellectual Traditions and Ideas:** History of ideas; Pre-Islamic poetry; Islamic scriptures and philosophy; Evolution of ideas during Abbasid era; External influences; Literary renaissance; Rereading of classical ideas.
- **II. Islam and Modernity:** Encounters with modernity; Intellectual response to colonialism; Islamic revivalism; Islamic modernism; Islamism; Salafism; Wahhabism; Jihadism.
- **III. Contemporary Arab Political Thought:** Arab identity; Renaissance (*al-nahda al-ʿarabīya*); Nationalism (*al-waṭanīya*); Arab nationalism (*al-qawmīya al-ʿarabīya*); pan-Arabism; Ba'athism; Egyptian Nationalism; Territorial manifestations of Nationalism.
- **IV. Feminism and Civil Society Movements**: Feminist traditions; Egyptian Feminism; Feminism and Nationalism; Islamic Feminism; Debates on Sexuality; Human rights; Civil society movements; Debates on democratisation.
- **V. Popular Culture in the Arab world**: Films; Arts; Mass media; Digital revolution; Arab public sphere; Cultural expressions; Encounters with globalisation.
